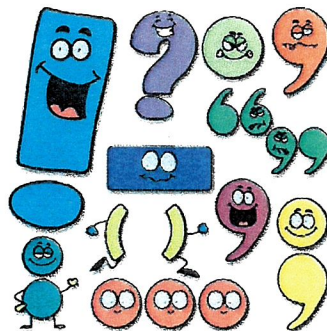

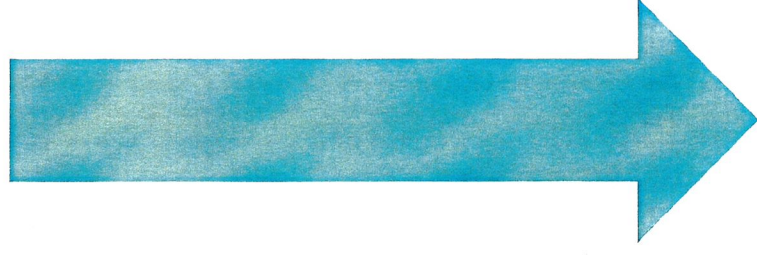

Look at this completed adverb arrow:



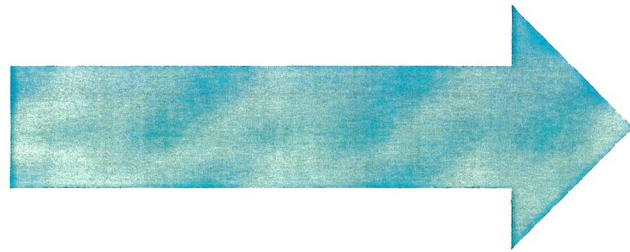

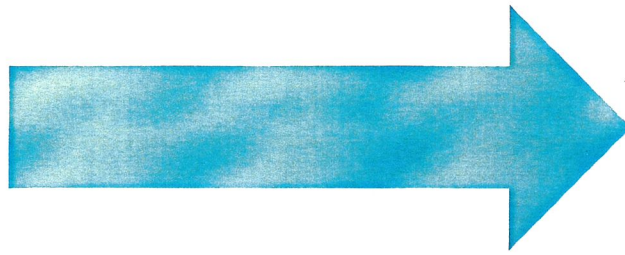

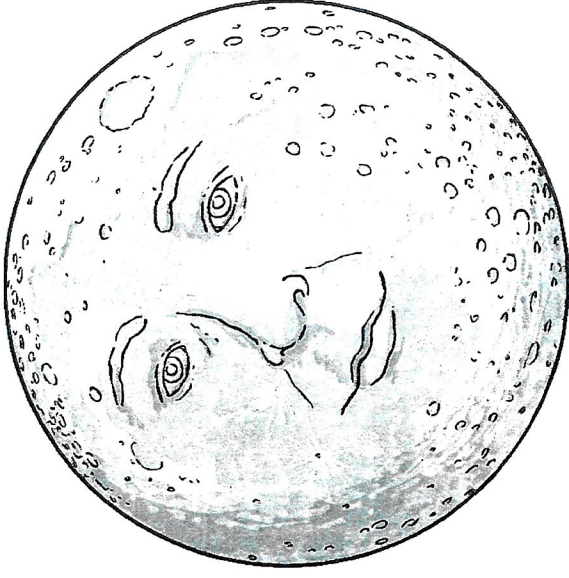
The Moon

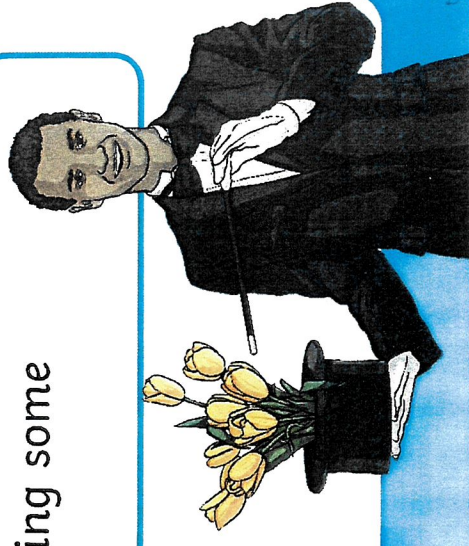

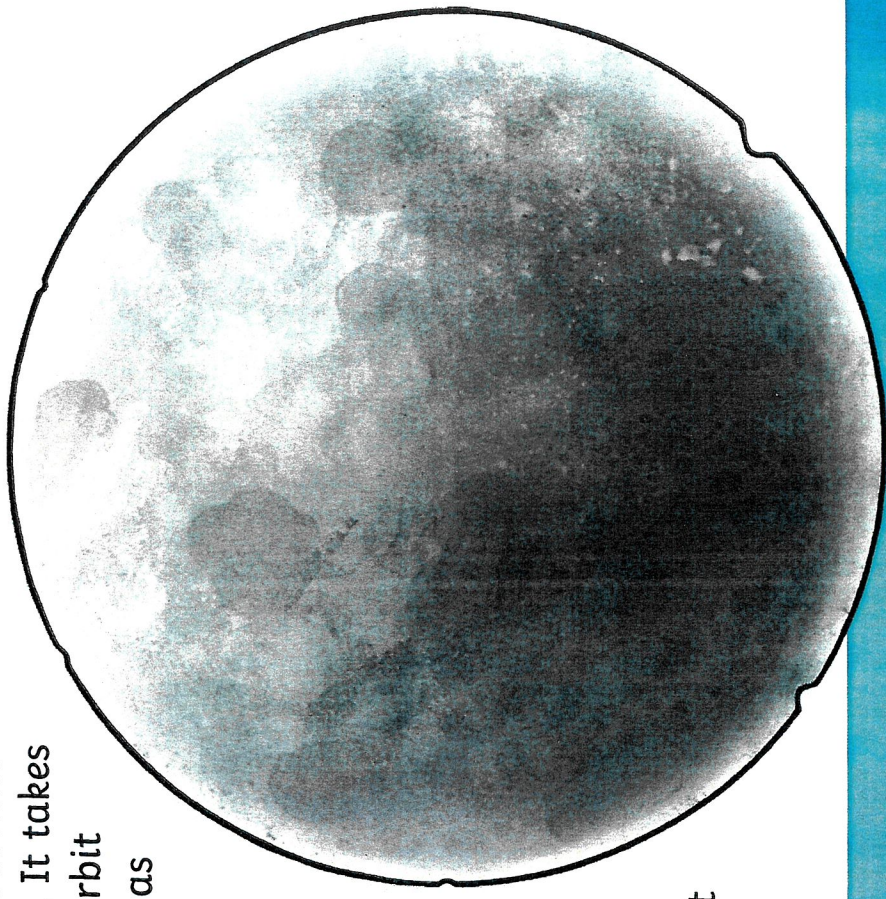

Finding the Facts

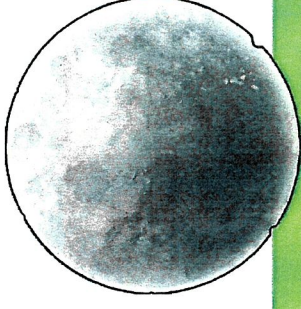
Read the passage below carefully.

The Moon

The Moon is the Earth's only natural satellite (an object that orbits a larger object). It takes the Moon approximately 28 days to orbit the Earth once and this is referred to as a lunar month. During this time, we only ever see the same side of the Moon as it rotates slowly whilst it moves around us. The Moon is not quite spherical and it is slightly heavier on one side so gravity keeps the heavier side facing us. The Moon is 238 857 miles from the Earth and has a diameter of 2160 miles. During the day, the average temperature on the Moon is 107°C but this drops to -153°C at night time.
